Ideas for the Future: The Neglected Festival

We all know the major festivals of our church, right? Christmas and Easter. They are the *two* major festivals of the ELCA. But not so fast. What about the neglected major festival? *What about Pentecost?*

Christmas and Easter are huge celebrations for at least two reasons:

- The biblical stories that are the foundations of these festivals (i.e., the birth of baby Jesus, the Savior of the world, and the resurrection from the dead of that same Jesus) are momentous.
- These religious festivals have been "picked up" or commercialized, if you will, by the secular world.

But not "poor, old" Pentecost. No Pentecost carols exist. No

Pentecost shopping. No Pentecost candies. No trees, lights, gifts, baskets, eggs or bunnies. We don't have Pentecost surrise services. Pentecost suffers from an inferiority complex. It's most often neglected.

We prepare for Christmas, the birth of the Christ child, by having four Sundays in Advent. We prepare for the celebration of Jesus' resurrection with special Ash Wednesday services and then 40 days of Lent followed by Holy Week. What preparation do we have for Pentecost? How do we make our parishioners ready for the coming of the Spirit? In most cases the answers to those questions are: "We have no specific preparations" and "We don't make them ready for the coming of the Spirit."

Why not? Why can't we? Why don't we? Back in 2001 I started something new before Pentecost. The congregation I served gave Pentecost a "warm-up week" similar to Advent and Lent. We designated the Sunday before Pentecost as "PrePent" Sunday. Red is the color for that season—much like having poinsettias at Christmas and lilies at Easter—so we had red geraniums at Pentecost. We made every effort to make this pre-Pentecost season very special. We didn't (and still don't) want Pentecost to continue to get short shrift on our festival calendar.

I wrote the above words for an article that appeared in *The Lutheran* in June 2001. It seems that Pentecost is still not celebrated like Christmas and Easter, so maybe my words are still relevant.

Therefore, I again raise my call to make our church one that can say, "We have *three* major festivals, and we celebrate all three!" Amen.

Words from the Bishop: Synod Office Report

In those days I will pour out my Spirit, God declares. Acts 2:17. 18

Pentecost Greetings to you in the name of the Holy Trinity as we welcome the coming of the Holy Spirit and celebrate the birth of Christ's Church this Sunday.

Last January, I wrote about liminal spaces. In her book *How to Lead When You Don't Know Where You're Going: Leading a Liminal Season*, Susan Beaumont describes the times and spaces that the church lives in today as "liminal," as standing in the threshold of an open door to something new but we haven't gone through yet. In this space, part of us stands in the former things, part in the future things, and part in the right now and here, the confusing and messy "this."

This threshold is not an easy space/time for us to live in. In this threshold between already and not yet, we find both anxiety of an unknown future and the grief of losing a dying past that felt stable (whether it was stable is another question). In the threshold, we feel pushed by some to go too quickly into something we feel we're not ready for yet or we feel held back by those clinging too tightly to something that doesn't work anymore.

And in this threshold we find God. In fact, it's in the liminal spaces, the times we aren't in control, the times of not knowing and uncertainty that we actually find ourselves closer to God than any other time.

The pouring of the Holy Spirit upon the disciples that Pentecost morning was definitely a liminal experience for them. Their self-constructed walls of future agendas, plans and judgments were torn away and they were brought face-to-face with what God was revealing to those around them through their own voices speaking unfamiliar tongues.

The pouring of the Holy Spirit upon us is a liminal experience as well. In fact, as followers of Christ who have been filled with the Spirit in our baptisms, every day is a liminal experience of wondering in awe and fear about what God may be doing next in our lives and the lives of the Church. Contrary to what some thought, there is not going to be a post-pandemic stability. We're still standing on the threshold between former things

and new possibilities, a time of both worry and wonder. And we may be standing there for a while.

It is in these times of liminality that the Holy Spirit can better break through our closed and frightened minds, hearts and wills. As our reliance on our own ways, goals and identities is peeled back layer by layer, we can begin to see more clearly God's presence with us and the new things that God has been, is and will be doing among us. We see through a glass dimly, for sure, but with open eyes, hearts and wills, we can see.

And not only does God appear more present to us during this time, but our Spirit-given faith (trust) tells us that "God is Able." This sermon title from Martin Luther King Jr. continues to resonate with me: that God is indeed able. I think we forget that at times and begin to believe it is all up to us. But God is able to bring abundance out of scarcity. God is able to bring hope out of despair. God is able to bring life out of death. God is able to do all this and more again and again.

It's in the liminal spaces that the Holy Spirit enters into our lives, sometimes with violent winds and tongues of fire, often with still small voices of witness to the new life in Christ every moment of every day. It's also in the liminal times that we need to cling to the promise that God is with us and is able to make change in us and through us whether we feel it or not.

As we celebrate Pentecost this week, I am offering my thanks to you for your ongoing work of equipping for the ministry of the Gospel in your liminal places across the Montana/N. Wyoming Synod. Thank you for the many resources, including the financial resources, you have shared with the synod, the ELCA and our ministries over the past year so that we can better equip you. Thank you for your time, energy, commitment and willingness to persist and be resilient in the many ways you have been called to serve Christ and his Church wherever you are located.

Quilters

Thursday, May 11 2023, we sent 94 quilts in 12 boxes that Day Spring had used to pack the Church's belongings and used them to pack quilts. They were all the same size and made it easier for the U-Haul driver to stack. Through donations and purchases on Quilt Sunday we were able to send \$235.00 to LWR for shipping costs.

More quilts were finished throughout the year and taken to the Furniture Bank, Rescue Mission, given to someone in need or sold on quilt Sunday. No one seems to know exactly when the women of Gold Hill started to make quilts. However we do have records as far back as 2008. Since that date our church has sent 2,408 quilts to LWR. The Quilts given locally to Rescue Mission, VA Hospital or sold on quilt Sunday is not recorded.

All fabric is donated. The expense is buying the batting which costs between 110 and 125 dollars per roll. One roll will make 25 to 28 quilts. Besides the cost of batting, shipping has increased to 40 dollars a roll.

Gloria Dei was so generous in allowing us to use their Fellowship Hall for layering and tying quilts while Gold Hill was being restored. Pastor Sarah and their quilting ladies would come in and visit and ask if we needed anything. It made us feel so welcome.

One of the highlights for us is Quilt Sunday when we display the quilts in the sanctuary for you to see. If you are interested in being involved; please come to the Fellowship Hall at 10:00 am on Wednesday's and bring a sack lunch.

Thank you to all who have donated fabric or helped in any way throughout the year. Thank you to those that purchased a quilt. We are so grateful to each of you.

Stone Soup Community Meal May 2023

We served on May 7, 14, and 28th. Between folks who showed up to serve and folks who came to eat and had food taken to the homebound, we served 22, 36, and 32 people so far.

Conversations are ongoing with the Health Department to get the kitchen certified with the Health Department. As we apply for Lutefisk annually this is familiar territory and the Sanitarian wants to help us be successful.

This means a change to part of this ministry and another opportunity for service. We will be meeting at the church to cook portions of the meal here, to chill or freeze as needed. I anticipate a ministry of cooks sharing spices, recipes, and fellowship cooking for our community.

We also have established a relationship with the Food Bank to collect food for preparation weekly. They are also very excited to see us succeed. This month's menu will begin with Asian meatballs, thanks to the generous donations of a case of meatballs from the Food Bank.

A big shout out to the people who made the food (so delicious!), and helped serve and clean up. Thank you to those that brought or invited their friends and family and to those that donated funds.

A special thanks to Byron DeWaay, Bill Hill, Samantha S, Lynn McGlynn, Danette Fitzpatrick, Miriam Haley, Chris Ketchum, Julie Corbin, Jeanette Nielsen, Patti Chain, and David Stordahl. Thank you to the folks who left goodies from the coffee hour.

Gold Hill Lutheran Church Council Minutes – May 9, 2023

David Stordahl called the meeting to order.

Danette provided devotions

Heatherlynn Meeks was a guest. She reported on the first week of the Stone Soup ministry. There were 19 in attendance and 6 "to go" meals. There is a need for salads, desserts, and hard boiled eggs. She responded to council questions. It was motioned, seconded and carried (MSC) to approve the minutes of the April 11, 2023 meeting

Treasurer's report: Danette previously distributed the April 2023 financial statements. GH has hired a cleaning service. We will request a certificate of insurance from them. The parsonage power bill has been transferred to the tenant's name. MSC to accept the treasurer's report.

President's report: David reflected on the Lenten and Easter services.

Administration Director report: Jon stated that the insurance policy has been renewed at the same cost. The parsonage lease is in place. There was a walkthrough of the parsonage. Gold Hill and Gloria Dei will enter into an agreement to share the cost of employing Tristyn Howard. GH will administer payroll and taxes. Tristyn will work 3 hours per day for each parish weekly. There was discussion on purchasing a cell phone so that Tristyn can receive calls for both parishes.

Worship ministry report: Shelly reported on the success of the Seder dinner. She reported on the letters for the letterboard, candle wicks, and the resumption of the "noisy offering" next Sunday. A new set of hymnals was ordered for the musicians. Worship on May 28, 2023 will be at Gloria Dei (Pentecost) to celebrate GH's confirmand.

Leadership Ministry report: Miriam discussed the cleaning contract, finishing of the key cabinet, and the

status of lock changes. She discussed security concerns and possible mitigation plans.

Spiritual Growth report: Pat discussed the schedule for Sunday School as the year ends. Vacation Bible School will be June 19-22. The original plan was for GH to host. There is a requirement to test the soil around the GH property this summer which may interfere with our ability to host.

Outreach Ministry: The council congratulated Nicholas on graduating with honors from MT Tech with a degree in accounting and human resources.

Pastor Sarah provided a report of her monthly activities (phone calls, home visits, counseling, etc.) Her workload has settled down. She would welcome volunteers to make home visits.

Other business:

Pastor Sarah discussed different worship settings. There are several different settings in the red hymnal. She suggested "synching up" with Gloria Dei so that we rotate the setting every 5 weeks. She also introduced a setting named "Behold". She discussed the special meaning of this setting to her. The consensus was that the change would bring vibrancy to our worship.

Gloria Dei has a quote for a new pictorial directory. If Gold Hill signed on, the cost would be \$300 for each congregation.

The council closed with the Lord's Prayer.

7 Pray for communities recovering from severe weather and disasters here and around the world. Ask God to surround them with hope, strength and caring neighbors throughout their recovery, and give thanks for the generous support and volunteer assistance offered through Lutheran Disaster Response and ELCA World Hunger in partnership with companion churches and other relief organizations and ministries, which provide relief and build resiliency.

10 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assembly of the Indiana-Kentucky Synod, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.

11 Give thanks to God for new members, confirmands, newly baptized people and visitors in our congregations; pray that we will welcome and include them, affirm and use their gifts, and celebrate and encourage their faith journeys.

12 Pray for the summer ministries of congregations that serve children and youth in our communities, and give thanks for leaders and volunteers of all ages who share their faith, time, gifts and hope with young people.

13 Remember in prayer youth and young adults working summer jobs, that they will find safe and affirming environments, build new relationships, gain new skills, earn fair wages and renew their spirit and strength in our communities of faith.

14 What people in your neighborhood and community are most often overlooked? Ask the Spirit to help us recognize and attend to the needs of our neighbors and

the diversity of gifts and insights they bring to the community and our congregations.

- 15 "Call on me in the day of trouble" (Psalm 50:15). Call on God if you're encountering difficulties, and express your gratitude and joy to God if things are going well.
- 16 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assemblies of the Northern Illinois, Southwestern Pennsylvania and Upper Susquehanna synods, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.
- 17 Pray for the leaders, voting members and others gathering for the assembly of the Allegheny Synod, that the Spirit will strengthen, guide and inspire them as they reflect on the mission of the church, choose leaders and encourage one another to proclaim the gospel and serve our neighbors in need.
- **18** Father's Day Remember in prayer fathers who strive to be loving, caring, wise and influential parents, including new fathers, single fathers, stepfathers and fathers who are deployed in the military or incarcerated.
- 19 Juneteenth People of faith have long known the importance of recalling and learning from history. - 23 Pray for those traveling this summer on vacation and sabbatical, that they will be safe, experience renewal and discover opportunities to serve others.
- 24 Sarah was amused and overjoyed at the birth of Isaac in her old age: "God has brought laughter for me; everyone who hears will laugh with me" (Genesis 21:6). Give praise and thanks to God for shaking up our lives and rewarding us when we least expect it.
- 25 Thank God for the work of the Spirit, which leads us to Christ, equips us to be faithful disciples and deepens our understanding of God's wisdom and ways throughout our life.
- **26** Remember in prayer high school students gathering for the Lutheran Summer Music Academy & Festival at Valparaiso University in Indiana. Ask God to bless their time together as they further their knowledge and skills and prepare for future careers and vocations.
