From the Pastor's Study

Greetings from Pastor Sarah!

We are cruising through this year, I can hardly believe that it is already November! I am a very visual person, and each month of the year has a color attached to it in my brain. November, is orange, and I see images of the cornucopia, pumpkins, and turkeys whenever I think about November.

Faith and Civic Engagement

We are nearing the end of the presidential election season and heading towards Election Day. Many of us are wondering: How do we ground ourselves in our faith as we approach the ballot box?

My polling location is in a Roman Catholic church in De Pere, Wisconsin. On election days, whether the election is for a new seat on the school board or for the President of the United States, the sanctuary doors are left open and the Eucharist is set out for adoration.

The first time I voted in the church, after putting my ballot in the machine in the community room, I wandered into the sanctuary just to sit. I did not feel a need to do a theological disputation about the rights and wrongs of Eucharistic adoration from a Lutheran perspective. In case you are not familiar, Eucharistic adoration is when a priest sets out bread and wine for communion and invites people not to eat or drink but just to sit nearby. There are a host of reasons why many Lutherans roll their eyes at this practice. But, I took it simply as an ecumenical invitation to sit in the presence of Christ with others. The sanctuary was not full, but there were several of us sitting there after casting our ballots. For me, the presence of God's love was palpable. At every election since, I have become accustomed to sit before and after casting my ballot in this sanctuary. It reminds me that the foundation of my faith is trusting that I am a beloved child of God.

What does it mean to participate politically while remaining mindful of Christian faith? The ELCA's new social statement, which is going through its last stages of editing, has a lot to say on this question. It says it well, and I encourage everyone to read it as it becomes available. Spoiler alert: the heart of the document is this: The foundation of our faith is that we are called in baptism as beloved children of God and that we are commanded to share that love with our neighbor.

What does this mean on Election Day? It means that not one of us becomes more holy, more justified, more pure, more Christian, more *good* based on how we behave on election day. The boxes we check and the political party we join do not help us climb a ladder to heaven or give us a stamp of approval from God. Our value, our status in God's eyes comes from God's love for us.

This is why going to church before voting might be helpful. Here is where taking communion or tangibly remembering one's baptism by dipping one's finger in

the font and crossing one's forehead can be meaningful. When I sit in the sanctuary next to the Eucharist, I remember that Christ calls me a friend and promises to give me peace and eternal life. I do not earn any of this by voting one way or the other.

Pause and remember that Christ calls you a friend and promises you peace and life. If going to church helps you remember that, go to church before you go to vote. If saying a prayer, singing a hymn, or simply sitting quietly for a moment helps you remember that, do that. Grounding yourself in that faith is the key to voting as a Christian.

Faith that I do not have to and that I cannot possibly earn my status as valuable or holy or Christian releases me from that pressure to earn my justification. Released from this burden, I can let go of all self-righteousness and attend to the commandment God gave all who participate in the Abrahamic traditions to love God with all our hearts and all our minds and all our strength (Deuteronomy 6:5) and love our neighbors as ourselves. (Leviticus 19:18). The ethical rule to love others as one loves oneself appears in other religious traditions too. It is also a rule that kindergarteners seem to know intuitively. There is remarkable consensus amongst human beings across the globe and throughout history that we are to love our neighbors as ourselves.

The Old and New Testaments don't name all people as equal, however. God commands us especially to care for the marginalized: the poor, the sick, the widow, the orphan, and the migrant (Deuteronomy 10:18, 24:17-22, 26:12-13, 27:19, Proverbs 15:25, Isaiah 1:17, Matthew 25:35; Luke 14:13; and on and on). So, a Christian's orientation is towards taking special, or preferential, care of the marginalized.

But beyond orientation, Scripture is silent. Which policies will best provide for the poor and the sick and which politician will best care for the migrant and the orphan? Neither Moses nor Jesus advise as to whether the Affordable Health Care Act will work better than another plan nor which tax system will best care for the poor. That discernment the individual must do for herself, using reason as best she can.

However well you reason, however you vote, however you lobby, however you act—this will not make you more or less beloved, pious, or righteous. Your vote will get you an “I voted sticker” but it will not get you an “I am Holier than Thou” sticker.

In the quiet of the church sanctuary, on election day, I remember that God's love is a gift to me. It is not a

prize in a voting competition. Remembering this makes me less annoyed when someone comes in with a t-shirt that suggests they are voting for different candidates and policies than I am. Less annoyed, more at peace, more confident in my own status as beloved, I can go out and quietly (or loudly) work for material solutions to material problems in order to serve as best I can my neighbors and all of creation.

I wish each of you peace and confidence as you enter the last few days of this election cycle.

1) Call to Order

- President David Stordahl called the meeting to order.

2) Attendance

3) Devotions

- Miriam shared the devotion.

4) Approval of the Minutes: September 10, 2024

- It was motioned, seconded, and carried (MSC) to approve the Council Meeting Minutes for September 10th, 2024.

5) Pastor's Report

- Pastor Sarah was out on vacation; nothing to report.

6) Treasurer's Report

- It was MSC to approve the August financial reports and September's financials will be provided later in the month.
- Danette shared the "Attack on Hunger" event financials report.

7) President's Report

- David provided an update on remediation activities. Remedial activities are complete and Gold Hill's cost for additional concrete/sidewalk work totaled \$6,100.00.

8) Administrative Director's Report

- Ty reported a committee has been formed consisting of Dave C., Peggy P., and himself for updating the Gold Hill constitution. The following items were discussed as potential revisions:
 - o The constitution will allow for contracts for services (e.g., repairs) up to 5% of the total annual budget without congregation approval.
 - o A quorum consisting of 35% of the congregation will be required for voting purposes.

- o Items subject to frequent changes will be moved to By-Laws and removed from the constitution to allow for more flexibility.
- o The role of Administrative Director will be changed to Vice President.
- Issues with a neighbor's turkeys were discussed; the Council agreed to start documenting events where they were on church property.

9) Worship Ministry

- Nothing to report.

10) Leadership Ministry

- Miriam continues to work on acquiring quotes for painting the church's doors and windows.
- The new sound system layout in the sanctuary was discussed.

11) Spiritual Growth Ministry

- Pat reported that Sunday School has begun and that she is receiving help from several parent volunteers.
- Vacation Bible School planning/scheduling for next year is ongoing.

12) Outreach Ministry

- Linda reported on recent Outreach Ministry efforts, which include a Sock-tober sock drive and the Butte Rescue Mission fundraiser/dinner which is scheduled for 10/10 at the Civic Center.

13) Other Business:

- It was reported that the insurance claimant associated with a recent fall had acquired a lawyer.
- The Council discussed coverage and volunteers for funeral services. It was agreed that a list of willing volunteers should be prepared to help with funeral services.
- The Council discussed the planning and scheduling of joint services with Gloria Dei.

**The meeting adjourned with the Lord's Prayer*

1 *All Saints Day* Remember and give thanks for saints who are now in God's eternal, loving care. Praise God for their significance in your life — their influence, example and faith.

2 *American Indian Heritage Month* Give thanks for our Indigenous neighbors and siblings in Christ, whose diverse gifts, traditions and wisdom help shape and enrich society and the church. Pray for the work of ELCA Indigenous Ministries and Tribal Relations and the Association of American Indians and Alaska Natives of the ELCA. Ask God to guide and further the work of our church and society to build better, right and just relationships with Indigenous peoples.

3 Pray that we will love God with all our heart, soul, mind and strength, and that God's abundant love and mercy will be reflected in our love for others.

4 Praise God for the wonders of the heavens, which stir our awe, curiosity and gratitude for God's infinite power and creativity. Give thanks for scientists, astronomers and explorers who deepen our knowledge and respect for creation and its mysteries.

5 *Election Day* "The right hand of God is planting in our land, planting seeds of freedom, hope, and love" (ELW 889). Ask the Spirit to help us exercise concern for our neighbor, the well-being of communities, and racial, gender and economic justice as we discern whom to elect as our leaders and public servants. Give thanks for ELCAvotes, an initiative to help us understand our role in promoting dignity and respect for all.

6 Pray for the Spirit to inspire us to share the good news of Jesus Christ and teach every generation about God's word, loving ways and active presence in the world, today and throughout history.

7 *National Homeless Youth Month* Remember and pray for young people who have no shelter or place where they feel safe, secure and cared for. Pray for community programs and ministries of our church that provide shelter, food, resources and support for developing self-sufficiency, and physical, emotional and spiritual care for youth.

8 Give thanks for the joy and certainty we experience when we walk in God's ways and follow God's

commandments as revealed to us in Scripture and the life and teachings of Jesus Christ.

9 Pray for those in the Gulf Coast and other regions of the Southeast who are grieving loss and recovering from the devastation of Hurricane Helene. Pray that their hope, faith and determination will remain strong and that we will offer generous support and assistance through Lutheran Disaster Response, communities of faith, volunteers and disaster recovery agencies — for as long as needed.

10 Pray for outdoor ministry leaders gathering for the Leadership Training Event and Lutheran Outdoor Ministries conference in Baltimore, Md. Ask God to equip and renew them for ministry with people of all ages, abilities and backgrounds.

11 *Veterans Day* This is a day when we remember, honor and give thanks for the service and sacrifice of veterans of the armed forces who have defended our country and worked for freedom and justice in the world. Pray that their families, caregivers and survivors will receive the support and care they need. Give thanks for the work of Federal Chaplaincy Ministries of the ELCA and of congregations with ministries serving veterans and their families.

12 Praise God for the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, who took upon himself the burden of our sins and human weaknesses so that we can know true freedom, be renewed for doing God's work in the world and take comfort in the promise of eternal life with God.

13 Remember in prayer our ministries in seven countries in the Asia-Pacific region. Pray for ELCA Global Mission personnel, including the missionaries, teachers, International Women Leaders and Horizon seminary interns working alongside companion churches to spread the gospel, grow the church and respond to community needs.

14 Pray for ELCA Church Council members meeting in Chicago to oversee and govern the ELCA churchwide organization. Pray for the Spirit to guide their discussions, their counsel and their decisions for the well-being, vitality and growth of the church.

15 Pray for Lutheran and Episcopal school leaders gathering in collaboration at the National Association of Episcopal Schools (NAES) Biennial Conference in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Give thanks for the ministries of

the NAES and the Evangelical Lutheran Education Association that equip, inspire and support Christian educators.

16 Ask God to help us welcome and treat immigrants, refugees and asylum-seekers with respect and compassion, accompanying them through the complex process of rebuilding their lives in our country.

17 Jesus warned that being his disciple is never easy or safe, but we are never alone or ill-equipped for doing God's work in the world — we are accompanied by the Spirit and our siblings in Christ. Praise God!

18 Give thanks for those who work in hospice care and attend to the comfort and quality of life of people as they approach the end of life, and who provide emotional and spiritual support for their families.

19 Ask the Spirit to nurture and sustain the confidence, wisdom, humility and faith of leaders in our church, synods, congregations and special ministries.

20 “You show me the path of life. In your presence there is fullness of joy” (Psalm 16:11). Express your gratitude to God, the light that guides us through life and brings true joy and fulfillment.

21 There are approximately 369,000 infants, children and youth in foster care in our country. Pray that foster families will provide them with stability, love, support and encouragement so that they thrive. Give thanks for foster parents and pray for the Spirit to equip them with wisdom, empathy, strength and skills for parenting.

22 “Let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another” (Hebrews 10:24-25). Pray that we — individually and as communities of faith — will be catalysts for love, kindness and inspiration in the church, our society and the world.

23 Remember in prayer our ministries in nine countries in the Latin America and Caribbean regions. Pray for ELCA Global Mission personnel, including the missionaries, teachers, International Women Leaders and Young Adults in Global Mission working alongside global companions to spread the gospel, strengthen and grow the church, and respond to community needs.

24 In a world of force, intimidation and superiority, pray that we will take to heart the leadership of Jesus Christ, whose power manifests in humility, love, mercy and justice.

25 Give thanks for the people and experiences that break into our daily routines, interjecting joy and laughter.

26 Ask God to make us enthusiastic witnesses to our faith through words, kindness, love for our neighbors in need and commitment to justice and peace. Pray that we will be mindful of opportunities to invite others to become followers of Jesus Christ and to welcome them into our communities of faith.

27 Praise God for gathering our collective gifts and resources through ELCA World Hunger and Lutheran Disaster Response to respond to the needs of our neighbor and end hunger and poverty.



28 *Day of Thanksgiving* Give thanks today — and every day — for what God provides to strengthen and sustain us and for those who work to feed the world, including farmers, agricultural workers, ranchers, commercial fishermen, food pantry staff and administrators of hunger relief programs such as ELCA World Hunger.

29 *Native American Heritage Day* “Let us remember the Indigenous peoples and tribal nations who were the first to love, pray, grow, celebrate, cry, drum, dance and sing upon these lands” (land acknowledgment from the 2022 Churchwide Assembly). Give thanks for the cultures, values, accomplishments and spirituality of Native Americans that continue to shape our nation and church. Pray that we will be persistent and sincere in learning more about Indigenous peoples and tribal nations and in working together to correct inaccuracies and injustices of history.

30 *Andrew, the Apostle* Andrew was the first of the 12 disciples to drop what he was doing and accept Jesus' invitation to follow him. Ask the Spirit to stir our faith and courage to respond to the call to do God's work in the world, wherever it takes us and whatever it requires of us.
